Refugee Group Lands in South Korea

SEOUL, South Korea, May 13—Nearly a thousand South Vietnamese refugees arrived in Pusan this morning, 17 days after they fled Saigon aboard two South Korean naval vessels. Upon disembarkation, they were warmly received by hundreds of citizens and port officials in Pusan, which is 210 miles south of here.

In addition to the Vietnamese, the evacuees included 33 overseas Chinese and one Filipino. There were also more than 300 South Koreans aboard the ships, which were LST's. Some of the Viet-

namese were dependents of Korean nationals; others were employes of Korean firms or agencies in South Vietnam.

Not all of the South Koreans have been evacuated from Saigon, it was learned yesterday. According to wire dispatches, more than a hundred still remain there.

Carrying bundles and children in their arms, the refugees boarded a fleet of waiting buses and were immediately taken to special refugee camps outside the city. A medical team of 20 doctors has been assigned to the camps.

Meanwhile, a third ship, a civilian freighter carrying refugees picked up from the South China Sea, will bring 217 more refugees in a matter of days.

The South Korean Government hopes to send the Vietnamese refugees to the United States or Australia.

Singapore to Admit 110
