

CANADA TO OUST SAIGON GENERAL

Inquiry Is Said to Confirm
Charges Against Quang

OTTAWA, July 7—The Canadian Government has ordered the deportation of Lieut. Gen. Dang Van Quang, who has been accused by other South Vietnamese refugees here of involvement in heroin traffic and other misdeeds ranging from smuggling to torture and murder.

Demands that he be deported came from Members of Parliament, academic circles, the press and the growing South Vietnamese refugee community. Immigration Minister Robert K. Andras said that an investigation had confirmed many of the charges. He said that General Quang 'has been asked

to leave Canada as soon as he can arrange for his admission to another country."

"We would like him out tomorrow, but we have to give him a chance to find somewhere to go," Mr. Andras said, adding that the general could be returned either to the United States, the country from which he had arrived in Canada May 15, or to South Vietnam.

Mr. Andras said that General Quang, described as a principal aide to former President Nguyen Van Thieu, had been guilty of "nefarious activities in the drug trade," among other crimes, and that the Government would fight any appeal of the deportation order.

General Quang came to Canada from the processing center for South Vietnamese refugees at Fort Chaffee, Ark. He has been living in Montreal with his wife and three children, who had arrived earlier.

Mr. Andras said that the general's family could not be deported, since they hold legal status as "landed immigrants," but he added that he hoped that they would leave with the general. General Quang, who has been in seclusion could not be reached for comment.
