Pro-Comm Urging Refugees
In U.S. to Return to Vietnam

CAMP REEDLETON, WASH.,
July 14 (UPI)—Pro-Communist
Vietnamese students have been
trying to persuade refugees
here to return to South Viet-
nam.

The refugees, who have only
scant knowledge of their new
land, are told that this marine
base is a small prison. When
they step out of it, the students
tell them, they will be engulfed
in a larger prison that is the
United States.

"A kind of subversive action
is being carried out by a small
group of Vietnamese students,"
said Tran Trong Trace, a volun-
teer worker in Camp Area 3.
"They came into this camp
as visitors or as volunteer En-
glish teachers and distributed
mimeographed newspapers
with pictures of Ho Chi Minh,
reports of the Communists' vic-
tory in Saigon and other tales
like how the refugees will be
ill-treated by American spon-
sors who will beat them, starve
them and exploit them as
slaves."

So far, the students' cam-
paign is said to be unsuccessful
because most of the refugees
are relieved to be here instead
of in their Communist-ruled
homeland.
