

**SAIGON PUBLISHES
OFFER OF AMNESTY**

SAIGON, South Vietnam, July 14 (UPI)—As part of a campaign to establish security, military authorities have promised amnesty to soldiers of the defeated South Vietnamese Army who turn themselves in now, even though the deadline has long passed, but have warned that anyone who opposes the new Government will be "severely punished."

A notice in the Saigon Daily Giai Phong signed by the military committee said soldiers reporting immediately for re-education would be "forgiven liberally."

At the same time, the Government is encouraging citizens to leave their money in banks so it can be used to rebuild the nation. A banking official said that special permission would be needed for withdrawals exceeding \$13 a month a person.

"The simple excuse that you need the money to pay debts will not be enough to take out the money," said a senior official of South Vietnam's national bank, at a weekend public meeting.

SAIGON, July 14 (Agence France-Presse) — Authorities are severely restricting foreigners' freedom to transfer their goods to Vietnamese citizens, according to a communique from the Military Administration Committee. Advance approval from the "competent administration" is required before "foreign individuals or legal entities" may transfer their goods, the communique said.
