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ADMISSION INTO U.N.

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UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Aug. 5—The permanent observers of North and South Vietnam held a news conference here today to press for separate memberships in the world organizations while maintaining that Vietnam was a united country.

In a joint statement, they accused the United States of maneuvering against an early consideration of their applications by the Security Council by linking the admission of the two Vietnamese states to that of South Korea in a package deal.

They said North Korea opposed applications for admission by the two Korean states as long as United States forces remained in South Korea.

The Vietnamese — Nguyen Van Luu of North Vietnam and Dinh Ba Thi of South Vietnam — said United Nations practice was to admit both parts of a divided country when both request it, as was the case of the two German states in 1973, and refuses to do so if the two parts disagree on entering the United Nations, as was the case of the two parts of Vietnam previously and the two parts of Korea at present.

The two representatives voiced their governments' willingness to establish normal relations with the United States "on the basis of the Paris agreement" and said they were prepared to discuss all issues, including the issue of Americans missing in action.
