U.S. AGAIN TO BLOCK VIETNAMS FROM U.N.

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UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Sept. 26—The United States served notice in the Security Council today that would repeat its vetoes of the admission of North and South Vietnam to the United Nations because membership was being refused to South Korea.

Daniel P. Moynihan, the American delegate, said in the Council that the vetoes cast last month would be repeated "with regret" because the United States "must insist that all three applicants be treated equally."

With a long list of third world countries nations supporting the admission of the two Vietnams, the Council adjourned debate until Monday.

Earlier, by a vote of 14 to 0 with the United States abstaining, the Council agreed to take up the admission requests of the two Vietnams. But Seoul's request lost by a 7 to 7 vote since a 9-vote majority of the 15 members required to put an item on the Council's agenda.

Applicants are admitted to membership by the General Assembly after they have been recommended by the Security Council.
