

# Sihanouk, at U.N., Praises Independence Groups

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Cambodian, Accorded Full Honors of a Head of State, Presses Attack on U.S. NYTimes

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UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Oct. 6—Prince Norodom Sihanouk of Cambodia told the General Assembly today that his country fully backed the movement for the independence of Puerto Rico and other such movements that he termed anti-imperialist and anticolonial.

He also denounced South Korea as a puppet of United States "imperialism" and rejected the recent proposal of Secretary of State Kissinger for an international conference on the future of Korea.

In his 45-minute address, Prince Sihanouk repeatedly attacked "United States imperialism" and paid tribute to American students and others who had opposed war in Indochina.

## Mozambican Cites Vietnam

Prince Sihanouk, the titular head of state of Cambodia, from which he was exiled five years ago, arrived in New York Friday. Today he received the full honors that the United Nations accords chiefs of state. Delegates rose and most applauded when he entered the Assembly hall. Princess Monique, his wife, was sitting in a special section for distinguished visitors at the side of Secretary General Waldheim.

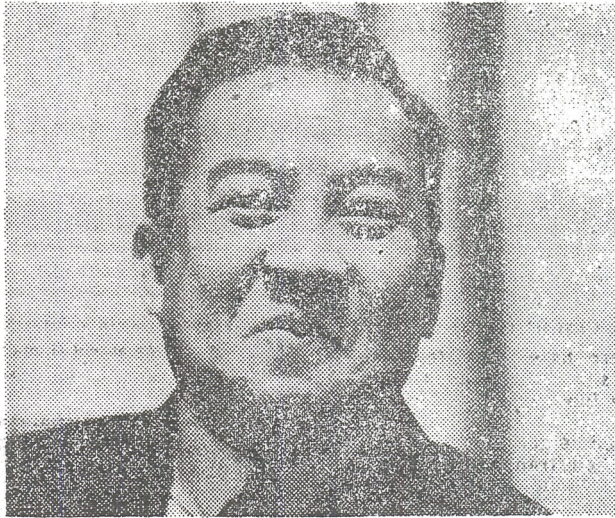
Earlier today, Foreign Minister Joaquim A. Chissano of Mozambique, a new United Nations member, told the General Assembly that his people's victory "in the struggle against Portuguese colonialism backed by international imperialism would not have been achieved so soon had it not benefited from the Vietnamese people's struggle."

Mr. Chissano assessed the economic situation in his country as "precarious." He pledged Mozambique, nevertheless, to "a complete and total boycott" of Rhodesia, the white-ruled neighboring country that up to recently has been shipping most of her foreign trade through Mozambican seaports.

## Israel Pullout Urged

Turning to the situation in Angola, another long-time Portuguese holding in Africa, the Mozambican described the Popular Movement for the Liberation of Angola, one of three Angolan Nationalist forces, as the leader of the emerging nation, which is to become independent on Nov. 11. The Popular Movement is known to be backed by Moscow.

Regarding the Middle East, Mr. Chissano suggested that

Israel "start a new chapter in her relations with her neighbors" by evacuating all Arab territories occupied in 1967 and recognizing the Palestinians' rights, as defined in United Nations documents. "Only acting thus will Israel be able to live in peace," he said.

This afternoon the General Assembly's Social, Humanitarian and Cultural Committee postponed for the second time consideration and a vote on an amendment that would equate Zionism with racism.

The amendment was introduced last week by Cuba and nine Arab nations, not including Egypt. The text was meant

to be an addition to a draft resolution on a program for the current Decade for Action to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination. The amendment would term Zionism "a form of racial discrimination to be included in the program."

The United States, Israel and the nine-member European Common Market announced that they would vote against the proposed text. Several black African nations, anxious to reach consensus on the program against racial discrimination, persuaded the sponsors of the amendment against Zionism to agree to put off a vote pending further consultations.
