

**NONMILITARY WOUND  
IS REPORTED AT KENT**

COLUMBUS, Ohio, May 8 (UPI)—An Ohio National Guard official said today that a "fragmentary report" showed that one of 10 students wounded on the Kent State University campus on Monday was struck by a "nonmilitary bullet."

Col. J. E. P. McCann, administrative assistant to the Ohio Adjutant General, said the report had been made by the National Guard's Inspector General's office.

"Medical evaluation concludes that one of the patients wounded at Kent State University had a gunshot wound in the back of the neck, one inch

from the spinal cord," Colonel McCann said. "The bullet entered the neck one inch from the spinal cord and exited from the left cheek."

Thomas Mackenzie, 21 years old, of Richboro, Pa., was admitted to St. Thomas Hospital in Akron with a bullet wound of the neck that hospital officials said exited through his cheek. He was discharged today.

State Senator Robert Stockdale of Kent, a member of the Kent State faculty, also said evidence he has seen indicated that one of the wounded students had not been struck by a .30-caliber bullet, the type used by the National Guard.
