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her go, Miss Fonda went to the Oleo Strut, a Killeen coffeehouse that caters to anti-war soldiers.

Miss Fonda, holding a news conference, said, "I am not here as a moviestar on a publicity kick."

"My country, right or wrong, is nobody's idea of patriotism," she said.

DEMANDS

The handbills Miss Fonda was distributing concerned three May 16 demonstration demands: Get out of South Vietnam, free Bobby Seale, chairman of the Black Panthers, and avenge the "Kent State Five."

In this connection, the handbill claimed an additional student at Kent State had died of bayonet wounds.

Rumors have circulated for a week that more than four students were killed at the shooting incident May 4 in Kent, Ohio.

Hospital officials treating the wounded say the rumors are not true. So do police.

The origins of the rumors were obscure, but may have been fanned by some student activists who cried they were demonstrating on campuses throughout the week on behalf of "The Kent State Six."

Jane Fonda Visits Ft. Hood---Briefly

Astres Janc Fonda was taken briefly into custody at an Army base yesterday

after ignoring a ban on distribution of anti-war pamphlets.

Miss Fonda went to the east gate of Ft. Hood, Texas, a tankers' training center, and tried to enter. Lieutenant John T. Hoffman stopped her. She asked him to let her go on the reservation and distribute the handbills.

The officer said it was illegal.

"You'll have to arrest me then because I consider it unconstitutional," the actress said.

SOLDIERS

A crowd of about 150 pressed around her and Hoffman. Two Ft. Hood soldiers in uniform took her handbills. Hoffman put her in a military police car and drove her to the Provost Marshal's office.

She was taken inside and read a letter permanently barring her from Ft. Hood. Then she was escorted outside and released.
