An Anti-Lindsay March

The Hard Hats Return

New York

Some 2000 pro-Nixon demonstrators were cheered and showered with tickertape in Wall Street yesterday before marching on to City Hall to proclaim their opposition to policies of Mayor John V. Lindsay.

The protesters, mostly construction workers from the financial district, were greeted enthusiastically by lunch hour Wall Street crowds and honored with traditional "paper snow" in the neighborhood of the New York Stock Exchange.

One placard which seemed to amuse the crowds read:

"Stop air pollution. Muzzle Mayor Lindsay."

The hour and 20 minute demonstration at city hall took place under the watchful eyes of hundreds of helmeted, riot-ready policemen. It was peaceful in contrast to a fist-swinging melee involving construction workers last Friday. The mayor was not present.

There were only two arrests for what police called minor infractions.

The demonstrators were not permitted in the park, as they had been on Friday when they stormed city hall and beat up anti-war demon-

strators and students at Pace college. Police held them to a march around the edges of the park led by three standard bearers carrying American flags. Pace was closed as a precaution.

The demonstrators, some of whom were business-suited financial area workers, chanted "Lindsay must go" and "all the way, U.S.A." some of the signs they carried bore such slogans as "impeach Lindsay," "demand Lindsay resign" and "support Nixon and Agnew."

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
