

# A Disappointing Talk With Mitchell

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## Washington

Six Duke University law school students said yesterday that Attorney General John N. Mitchell characterized Saturday's mass anti-war demonstration in Washington as "lethargic" and led in part by speakers "directed from Hanoi."

The neatly dressed students spent more than an hour in Mitchell's private off-

ice. They came away, said one "diappointed that he doesn't recognize the broad area of dissent to the war.

"He still thinks in terms of a few anarchists," Randolph May, Wilmington, N.C., told reporters.

He characterized the demonstrations Saturday as so lethargic that people couldn't even cheer at their own speakers," May said. "He

characterized some of the speakers as being directed from Hanoi."

The students said they gave Mitchell a copy of a petition they said they mailed to the President stating their belief that Mr. Nixon exceeded his constitutional power by ordering U.S. troops into Cambodia. They said it was signed by 165 out of the 293 Duke law school students.

Mr. Nixon won his law degree from Duke in 1937.

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
