ACLU Says Cops Fired At Students

Buffalo, N.Y.

The American Civil Liberties Union chapter said yesterday there is evidence that policemen drove through State University campus last month firing birdshot from a patrol car and wounding several students.

The ACLU's investigation indicated at least two and perhaps three uniformed policemen apparently fired on the students demonstrating in protest against the gunshot slayings of four students by National Guardsmen at Kent State University in Kent, Ohio, three days earlier.

Police Commissioner Frank N. Felicetta denied his police were involved. He said "shotgun pellet ammunition was not used or possessed by any Buffalo police officer assigned there." He also speculated that someone else could have fired the shots.

He also said, "I'd just as soon forget what happened on the Buffalo campus that night."

The night was Thursday, May 7 — the third straight night of confrontations between rock-throwing students and police using tear gas.

The Kent State slayings took place on May 4.

According to information from students and doctors, a white Buffalo police station wagon drove around the area of Norton Hall—the university student union—and a number of shotgun blasts were fired at students from he moving automobile.
