The police have issued 47 warrants against hecklers and have arrested 32 since the rally for violating an old state law that forbids "disruption of a religious service." Among those charged were three University of Tennessee faculty. versity of Tennessee faculty members.

Today, a member of the faculty telephoned Dr. Alexander Heard, chancellor of Vanderbilt University in Nashville, who is serving as a temporary consultant to the President on campus unrest. The faculty member explained that the arrests were becoming an issue at the Knoxville campus.
