

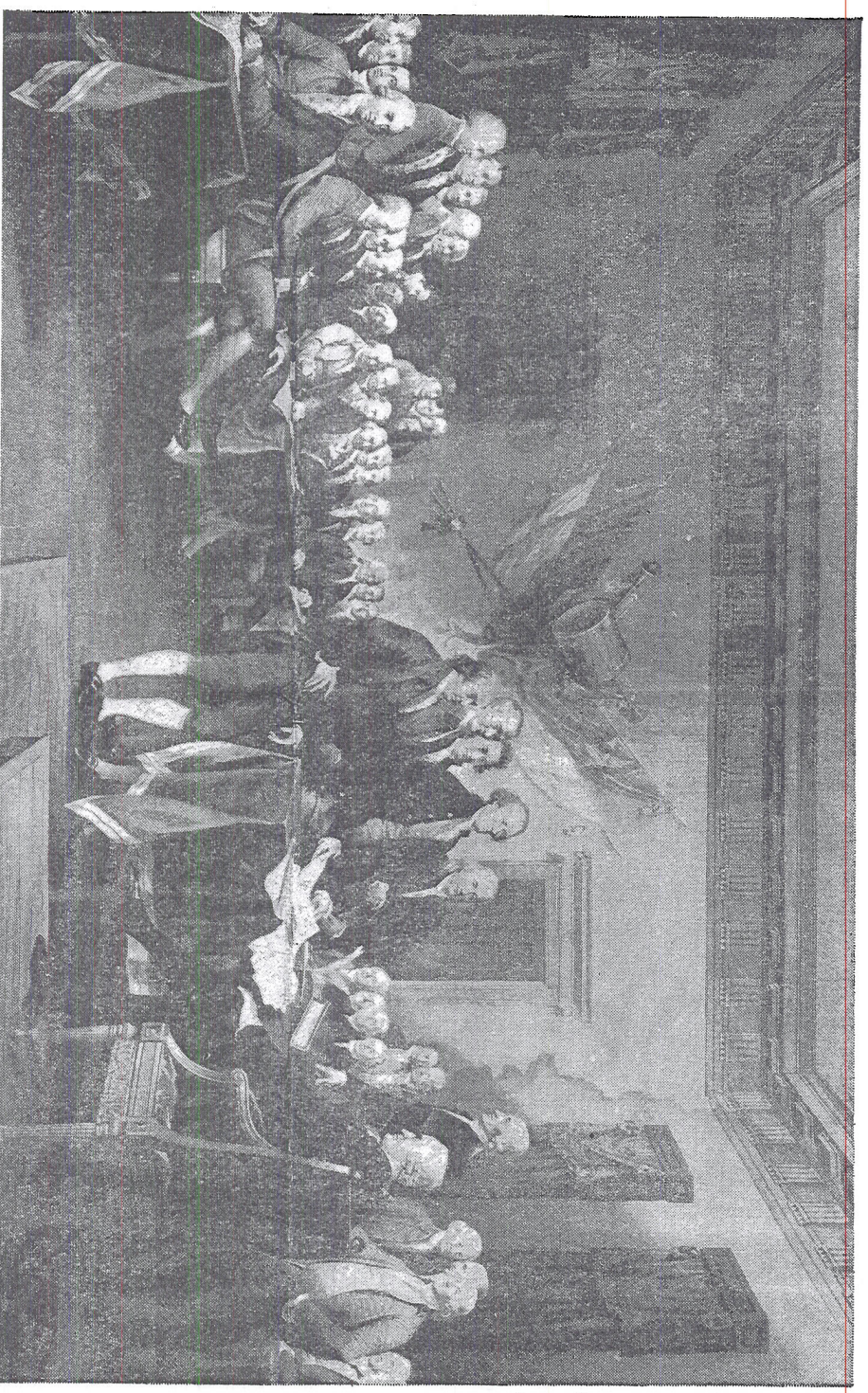

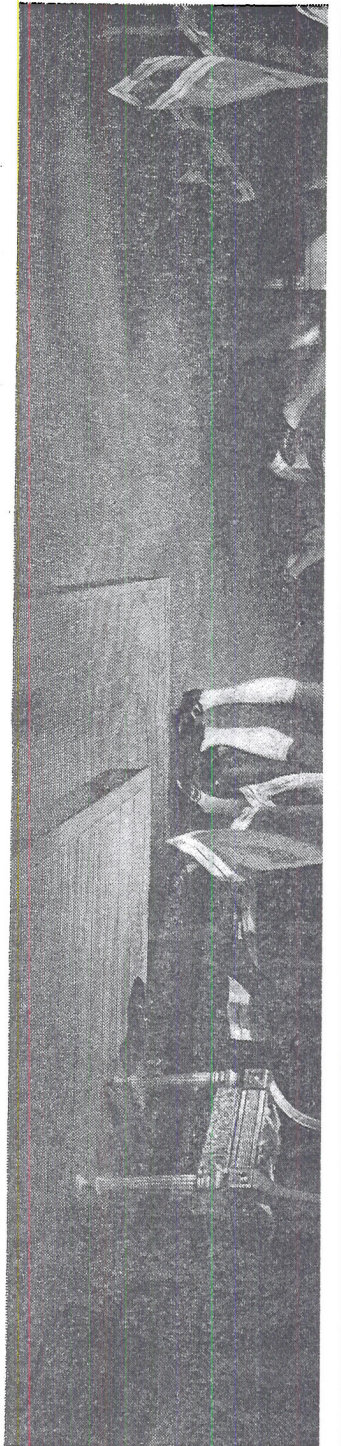

THE AMENDMENT TO END THE WAR*





* In the Constitution, the Founding Fathers determined that no one man in the United States should have the absolute power to make war. In the Constitution they devised a balance of powers. Congress, alone, could declare war and raise and maintain armed forces. The President, as Commander-in-Chief, was empowered to decide on the deployment of the armed forces.

THE AMENDMENT TO END THE WAR gives the American people a new opportunity to make our Constitution work as the Founding Fathers intended.

It would restore the partnership between President and Congress and bring the Indochina war to an end. Senator George McGovern has declared that the Amendment would be "an act of law, which, if carried, will put an end to this war in a systematic way."

We ask you to join us in this effort to restore the principles of the Constitution and, at the same time, to bring the war in Indochina, in which we have been mired for years, to a safe and early end. Explain **THE AMENDMENT TO END THE WAR** to your friends, neighbors, business associates, your fellow employees and your fellow students. Ask them to join in speaking out.

Congress, as the people's representatives, will vote on this Amendment. Write, wire, call or visit your Senators and Congressmen. Let Congress know where you stand!



THE AMENDMENT TO END THE WAR provides for:

1. The final withdrawal of American forces from Cambodia 30 days after adoption.
2. The final withdrawal of American forces from Laos by December 31st, 1970.
3. No further funds for military operations in Viet Nam after December 31st, 1970, except for the safe and secure withdrawal of American forces, asylum for Viet Namese endangered by the withdrawal, the exchange of prisoners and non-military aid to Viet Nam. The withdrawal would be completed by June 30th, 1971, unless the President and the Congress agree to an extension.
