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**Campus Panelist  
Upset That Nixon  
Lets Agnew Speak**

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., July 6 (UPI)—Joseph Rhodes Jr., a member of the Presidential Commission on Campus Unrest, says he is disturbed that President Nixon has not been able to control Vice President Agnew's rhetoric.

"It bothers me the President hasn't been able to quiet the Vice President down," Mr. Rhodes said yesterday in response to Mr. Agnew's second public urging that Mr. Rhodes be dropped from the commission.

Mr. Rhodes said today he had been assured by a member of the White House staff that "if I was quiet, they'd deep him quiet. So I've been quiet." Mr. Rhodes declined to identify the White House staff member.

Mr. Agnew accused him Saturday of "harebrained, unprovable bluster" that should disqualify him from the commission.

The Vice President said his criticism was not aimed at Mr. Rhodes's private right to dissent, but at his role as an investigator.

"Fact-finding investigation does not properly begin with a recitation of unsubstantiated opinion by the investigators," Mr. Agnew said.

Mr. Agnew was referring to a statement by Mr. Rhodes that Gov. Ronald Reagan of California was "bent on killing people for his own political gain."

Mr. Rhodes said yesterday, "I'm working very hard on this commission, and I just don't have the time to get into this kind of an exchange with the Vice President.

"It's a very difficult situation, and it worries me that we have this kind of public spectacle."

Mr. Rhodes, a 22-year-old Harvard graduate fellow and the only Negro on the commission, made his statement about Governor Reagan shortly after his appointment to the board. Mr. Nixon has declined to remove him from the body despite the urging of Mr. Agnew.
