

Student Group Calls Rallies to Protest Move Against Laos

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ANN ARBOR, Mich., Feb. 7— A national student conference on a "people's peace treaty" ended today with calls for a demonstration in Washington during the first week of May and nationwide local demonstrations Wednesday to protest what the conference charged was an invasion of Laos.

The conference, attended by more than 2,000 youths from around the country, was called to discuss the peace treaty and means of implementing it in the United States.

Spokesmen said the May rally in Washington would be designed to disrupt the Federal Government. The details will be decided by a committee of regional representatives selected by the conference.

The "people's peace treaty" was negotiated by a delegation from the National Student Association that traveled to Vietnam and met with representatives of the North Vietnamese Government and the Vietcong.

The treaty is similar to an eight-point proposal presented by the Vietnam delegation to the Paris peace talks. The treaty calls for immediate American withdrawal from Vietnam, the release of all political and war prisoners and self-determination for the people of Vietnam.

The proposal approved by the conference here stated "that we call for demonstrations across the nation on Feb. 10 and that we issue an ultimatum to the Nixon Administration that if he doesn't stop the war by May 1 we will stop the Government of the U.S."

The conference, which began Friday, included workshops and caucuses concerning the treaty. The Vietcong sent several communications to the conference.
