

Congress Is Urged To Impeach Nixon

Americans for Democratic Action urged Congress yesterday to impeach President Nixon for "high crimes" in Indochina and to create a commission to investigate the conduct of the war.

The resolution, adopted as the organization ended its 24th annual convention, described the war as a violation of constitutional provisions dealing with the duties of the Executive and Legislative branches of the federal government.

It also charged that crimes against humanity were committed under standards followed by the Nuremburg war criminal trials after World War II.

The ADA convention last year also asked that Mr. Nixon be impeached because of the United States incursion into Cambodia.

The impeachment amendment was submitted by David Brauner of New York City. The basic resolution had been prepared by the convention's Foreign Policy Commission.

Critics of the amendment argued that the ADA should concentrate on efforts to end the war and prevent Mr. Nixon's re-election in 1972.

In another resolution, the ADA joined those calling for admission of Communist China to the United Nations,

and urged that the United States establish economic, social, cultural and diplomatic relations with Peking. It asked, however, that the Nationalist Chinese government maintain its U.N. membership.

The ADA also reversed its 1970 support for an all-volunteer army and endorsed a continuation of the draft with conditions.
