Carrier's Brig

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The carrier Constellation arrived at Pearl Harbor yesterday with nine anti-war sailors in its brig.

A Navy spokesman said the men had been found guilty at captain's mast Saturday of missing the ship's movement from San Diego October 1; of being absent without authorization, and of shirking important service.

The men had been flown to the 80,000-ton carrier October 2 after being arrested at a church where they had taken sanctuary to avoid sailing to the Southeast Asia war zone.

The spokesman said the men had been sentenced to 30 days' correctional custody, which allows them to leave the brig for work during the day if they wish.

But, the spokesman said, the men had refused to work.

In addition to the 30 days' custody, the men were sentenced to forfeiture of half pay for two months and to reduction in rank to the next lower pay grade, the spokesman said.
