

**Antiwar Protest Is Planned
At Michigan Football Game**

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ANN ARBOR, Mich., Oct. 23 —More than half of the University of Michigan's football team joined 750 other students this week in signing petitions supporting an antiwar show during half-time at the homecoming game against Indiana next Saturday.

"Bring all the troops home now; let's have a real homecoming this year," the petitions said.

The petitions call for students and the school's band to march in peace symbols

while members of the local chapter of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War read the names of the school's war dead over the stadium public address system.

The university's president, Robben W. Fleming, who has personally taken an antiwar position, said in an interview yesterday, "The coalition of local peace groups organizing the petition drive is showing just terrible judgment. I think people come to the stadium on Saturdays to see football, not demonstrations."

**Antiwar Protesters Plan
Washington Rally Today**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24, (UPI) —Antiwar activists will gather in Washington tomorrow to begin what they call "Phase One" of a two-day plan to evict President Nixon from the White House.

At the request of the Justice Department, an estimated total of 2,000 troops were put on alert in preparation for the demonstration, which the activist Rennie Davis said would

draw 10,000 protesters, to the Capital.

The People's Coalition for Peace and Justice, the organizers of last spring's May Day civil disobedience demonstrations here, said it had obtained a permit to rally at the Washington Monument grounds tomorrow and then march in a single-file, candlelight procession past the White House.

Mr. Davis said that on Tuesday, the protesters, without a permit, would attempt to serve an eviction notice on Mr. Nixon at the White House.
