Labor Chiefs In Hanoi on 'Ending War'

NEW YORK — (AP) — Three American labor leaders are in North Vietnam on a one-week trip whose aim is, "to do what we can to see an end to this immoral and senseless war," the New York Times said yesterday.

A dispatch from Hanoi by Seymour M. Hersh, freelance journalist who won the Pulitzer Prize for disclosing the My Lai massacre, said the Americans were greeted Friday by a flower-laden delegation headed by Le Van, a member of the secretariat of the North Vietnamese Federation of Trade Unions.

The Americans are David Livingston of New York, president of District 65, Dis-

tributive Workers of America; Harold Gibbon of St. Louis, vice president of the Teamsters Union, and Clifton Caldwell of Boston, vice president of the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen.

"We hope this trip will confirm our feeling that the Vietnamese are prepared to end this war on a reasonable basis," Livingston said. The trio said they were traveling with the full support of their union memberships, Hersh said.
