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## EXPERT TESTIFIES ON KENT STATE FILM

CLEVELAND, Aug. 4 (UPI)—  
Three students at Kent State University were within 85 feet of Ohio National Guardsmen when the troops opened fire in a May 4, 1970, campus antiwar disturbance, according to Robert A. Johnson, a film expert.

Mr. Johnson, in testimony today before a Federal Court jury hearing a \$4.6-million damage suit arising out of the shootings, said that in his opinion there was no "rush" of students toward Guard troops when the shots rang out, killing four students and wounding nine others.

He testified that he formed his opinions after analyzing a movie taken that day by Christopher Abell, a student, from the fifth floor of his dormitory, which was about a half-mile from where the confrontation took place.

"The film shows the closest students to the Guard were crossing the sidewalk moving downhill away from the guard," Mr. Johnson said during questioning by David Ensdahl, a lawyer for the plaintiffs.

Mr. Johnson is expected to be cross-examined by the defense, which has maintained that the Guardsmen opened fire as a group of students rushed toward them.
