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525 American Advisers and Trainers Teaching Thais Counterinsurgency Rule

They said yesterday that 245 of these were members of "advisory components" for regular Thai military units and 280 were United States Special Forces soldiers training the"

The United States Government mission also employs 28,000 Thai civilians, mostly in jobs supporting the American military men here.

The highest total of American military men in Thailand was reached in 1969, when 48,000 were stationed here. In that year, the number was cut to 38,000. In September of 1970, the United States announced an additional cut of about 6,000 to be put into effect by last July 1. 1996
