Hanoi Hopes for Mutiny And Uprisings in South

HANOI, North Vietnam, April 5 (Agence France-Presse)—The focus in the Hanoi press today appeared to be the potential for mutiny in the South Vietnamese Army and insurrection in the cities.

While there was no information on the current military situation in South Vietnam, a close reading of the official press indicated that many believe that the outcome of the latest phase in the Indochina war depends on the response of the South Vietnamese Army.

The papers commented at length on a "mutiny" in the 56th South Vietnamese Regiment and in its headquarters at Camp Carroll. They also said that virtually the entire militia in Quangtri Province, which adjoins North Vietnam, had defected.

The papers also noted a dispatch from the Vietcong's press agency saying that 132 men of the 147th South Vietnamese Marine Brigade and Third Infantry Division at Quaivac, four miles southwest of Dongha, had surrendered.

These units had previously manned positions around Camp Carroll, which has been taken by "revolutionary forces," the papers said.

The Communist party newspaper Nhan Dan wrote: "Those who have a conscience in Saigon — and they are many — know the crimes of the Americans and the Thieu Administration, the rottenness of the regime.

"This leads naturally to collective opposition against the war, to mutinies, insurrections and participation in popular up-

risings when the opportunity presents itself."

The paper recalled an appeal by the Vietcong's provisional revolutionary government on Jan. 25 calling on all South Vietnamese, whatever their political past, to "rejoin the people."

Today's papers also published extracts from the Western press demonstrating "the failure of Vietnamization in Quangtri," the "collapse of the South Vietnamese Army" and the "helter-skelter flight of Saigon units."

The appeal in the United States by Senator George McGovern, a candidate for the Democratic Presidential nomination, for a total pullout from Vietnam was also prominently displayed.

Nhan Dan devoted its editorial to the mobilization in Hanoi in preparation for possible United States air attacks. Sirens have been tested, but without causing any stir and the capital was reported calm.

Hanoi has protested the bombing and shelling of North Vietnamese territory by American planes and ships at the beginning of this week.

Farm Loan Fund Released

WASHINGTON, April 5 (UPI)—The Administration today released \$38-million that can be lent by the Agriculture Department's Farmers Home Administration to help low-income farmers put in their 1972 crops. The money is part of \$75-million frozen by the White House Office of Management and Budget.
