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CHICAGO — (AP) — Marcus G. Raskin, a former member of the National Security Council, reports in the Chicago Sun - Times that North Vietnamese troops in South Vietnam have been told to reopen fire on U.S. troops in response to renewed U.S. bombing of North Vietnam.

A copyright story from

Paris by Raskin, now co-director of the Institute for Policy Studies in Washington, appeared in the paper's Sunday editions. The paper said that Raskin, a council member under President Kennedy, wrote the story after a four-hour interview yesterday with the North Vietnamese delegation to the Paris peace talks.

Raskin wrote that "the North Vietnamese disclosed yesterday that their forces in South Vietnam have been ordered to reopen fire on U.S. troops as part of the current offensive and in response to the renewed U.S. bombing of North Vietnam."

The North Vietnamese have never admitted that they have troops in South

Vietnam and Raskin's story paraphrased but did not directly quote a member of the North Vietnamese delegation as referring to North Vietnamese troops in South Vietnam.

Raskin's story related that Nguyen Minh Vy, deputy of the North Vietnamese delegation, said that prior to the recent offensive North Viet-

namese and Viet Cong troops were ordered to "abstain from attacking withdrawing American units or individuals."

### Unlimited Bombing

The story said that Vy insisted the United States is engaged in "unlimited" bombing short of using nuclear weapons.

But Vy was quoted as say-

ing military targets in North Vietnam are camouflaged and that consequently American bombers "have no choice but to bomb indiscriminately."

The story quoted Vy as saying that now "it is natural that the American forces will be attacked."

The only way attacks on American forces can be

avoided, Vy was quoted as saying, was by the United States setting a "date for withdrawal."

### Peace Parleys

Raskin said Vy told him the peace talks which were indefinitely suspended by the United States last month will be resumed and that the North Vietnamese were willing to compromise on the

structure of a new government in Saigon.

There are people in the present government of President Nguyen Van Thieu who would be acceptable to the North in establishing a new government, Vy was quoted as saying but he refused to name them, saying that to do so would be to "risk their lives."
