Not since the Tet offensive of 1968 have so many civilians been displaced, wounded or killed. The greatest number of refugees—150,000—have come Government's resettlement professor.

The Government has promised to give each family several acres of land and to help them build new homes.

Dr. Phan Quang Dan, who is directing Government aid to civilian war victims, said that in all, 10,000 refugees in Huehad accepted a Government offer of resettlement farther south.

trickling back.
A series of relatively unpublicized attacks in the last week, in Quangngai and Binhdinh Provinces, half-way up the coast, have created the second largest concentration of refugees -45,000 is the estimate. The North Vietnamese have burned about 20 villages in the two provinces, according to Dr. Dan.

Dr. Dan said that most of the civilian casualties have occurred in Binhlong Province, northwest of Saigon, where the North Vietnamese have been trying for several days to take Anloc. There are 15,000 known refugees in Binhlong but, and American said, "I'd be very surprised if there weren't more like 30,000."
