## U.S. Aides Believe Two Whites Are Active in Enemy's Invasion

QUINHON, South Vietnam, April 30—American intelligence officers and advisers here believe that the enemy forces that have occupied northern Binh Dinh Province have two Caucasians, possibly Americans, operating with them in either an advisory or a combatant role.

Though there have often been similar rumors in the past, highly reliable American officers here have heard the report from enough different Vietnamese in northern Binh Dinh this month to believe it.

"We've ruled out the possibility that they were prisoners," one officer said. "Refugees who came out of Hoaian District last week said that the two men were kicking the bodies of South Vietnamese soldiers and talking excellent Vietnamese with a North Vietnamese lieutenant from a battalion of the Second Regiment."

According to some reports, the men, one of whom is tall

and blond, conversed in English. Other reports say that they spoke some other language.

The reports first came in before the offensive, from agents spying on the North Vietnamese in their mountain redoubts in the center of Binh Dinh Province.

After enemy forces began attacking Hoaian District in the northern part of the province toward the middle of this month, refugees who spoke with American advisers said they had seen the two men operating with the North Vietnamese.

"Ten to fifteen different people claim to have seen them," one officer said. "They said they were wearing khakis or fatigues of the kind the North Vietnamese wear."

Hoaian District was yielded to the enemy on April 19 when Government troops fled and American advisers withdrew.

"I'd like to talk to one of those guys," one adviser said. "I could give him a briefing on all the problems he'll have."
