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Communist drive south from the demilitarized zone.

The specialists said that, if the Communists succeed in taking the city of Hue, they might well declare that city the seat of the Vietcong's provisional revolutionary government of South Vietnam. This has long been regarded as a prime political objective of the current offensive.

In a separate broadcast earlier this morning, the Vietcong radio delivered an emotional appeal to the people of Hue and the surrounding Thuathien Province to "take to the streets" in a general uprising against the Saigon administration.

Arguing that the recent vic-tories had created "the most favorable conditions ever known for our people's anti-United States national salvation struggle," it also urged South

Vietnamese soldiers and militia to "mutiny, drop their weapons, quit their ranks and return to the people."

The broadcast promised that all defecting soldiers would be well treated in accordance with a 10-point amnesty program an-nounced by the Vietcong on Jan. 26.

It also urged all the workers and students of Hue to rise up and "fight until the Americans leave and the puppets are toppled."

WASHINGTON, May 4-Following is the text of a broadcast in Vietnamese by the Vietcong's clandestine radio of the order issued today by the Quangtri city revolutionary committee. It was monitored and translated here by the Foreign Broadcast Information Service of the Central Intelligence Agency.

The newly established Quangtri provincial capital provisional people's revolutionary committee has just issued the following communiqué:

Our armed forces and people have completely liberated Quangtri provincial capital. The revolutionary administration has been set up. It makes public the following points:

1. Eliminate the adminis-tration and the various organizations set up by the United States-Thieu clique.

2. Officers and men of the puppet army, police agents and puppet administrative personnel, members of the secret service, spy organizations, and of reactionary political parties and sects must report to the revolutionary administration and turn in weapons, documents and

radios. Anyone who tries to escape to continue to oper-ate for the enemy will be severely punished.

3. Everyone must strictly abide by order and security, avoid violating the people's lives and property, including the property whose owners are not in the provincial capital; abstain from circulating false rumors and from stealing weapons, vehicles and ordnance and quartermaster equipment belonging to the army or left behind by the enemy.

4. Everyone is responsible for preserving military secrets and helping army units and the revolutionary administration.

Anyone who satisfactorily implements these specifications will be welcomed. Anyone who intentionally violates them will be punished.
