Timing of Invasion By North Vietnam

A signal from the Front:

A friend of Gen. Creighton Abrams' staff writes, as of April 29, "The situation in Quang Tri province, the northernmost, looks grave. It was merely serious until yesterday when the Communists renewed their assault on the city. It's a toss-up now as to what may happen.

"I think the North Vietnamese leadership decided to invade the south earlier than expected because they feared South Vietnam's rapidly growing strength.

"The Communists probably felt that if they waited until July-August-September (as President Thieu thought they would) South Vietnam might be too much for them. Also, they probably wanted to try for a military victory while the U.S. still had a sizable contingent of troops here, knowing we would not put them into combat.

"If successful, North Vietnamese propaganda could crow that the mighty United States was unable to stop them.

"The Soviets, at least to some extent, probably influenced Hanoi's decision to strike now. If North Vietnam won its gamble, by taking significant pieces of South Vietnam, President Nixon's position would be weakened

at the Moscow summit."
