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# No Russ, China Aid to Hanoi

SAIGON — (CDN) — Ranking U.S. sources here are encouraged that neither Russia nor China, North Vietnam's two major allies, has attempted to break, bypass or help repair the damage resulting from the American blockade and bombing campaign.

One top intelligence source said if either country were going to try to help keep the heavy flow of war materials moving into North Vietnam, they would have made some effort to do so by now. It has been almost three weeks since underwater mines were activated in North Vietnam's ports

and rivers and U.S. bombing was stepped up.

"We would certainly see an airlift under way by now if one were planned," one source said.

That nothing has happened "indicates both the Chinese and Soviets are terribly uninterested in whether North Vietnam wins in South Vietnam," this source said. He discounted the possibility that Russia was waiting for President Nixon's visit there to end before acting.

Since the U.S. mining and stepped-up bombing operations began May 11, North Vietnam has received virtually no new war material, intelligence sources said.

### In China

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HONG KONG — (AP) — Two East German freighters loaded with supplies for North Vietnam have sailed out of Hong Kong harbor for the Chinese port of Whampoa, 45 miles up the Pearl River estuary, shipping sources reported today.

The two freighters were diverted from Haiphong after U.S. planes mined approaches to the North Vietnamese ports in an attempt to choke off supplies.

Shipping sources in Hong Kong said the two ships apparently plan to unload their cargo at Whampoa for possible rail transshipment from China into North Vietnam.

The decks of both ships were seen loaded with heavy trucks.

Their departure for the Chinese port came after Peking announced arrangements were under way for ships to land Hanoi - destined cargo in China for handling.
