A Try to Subpoena Jane Rejected

Washington

An attempt to subpoena actress Jane Fonda to testify about her Hanoi visit and anti-war broadcasts was rejected by the House Internal Security Committee yesterday.

"A majority of the members thought any subpoena would be premature," Representative Richard H. Ichord (Dem-Mo.), the committee chairman, told reporters after the nine-man panel met privately for an hour to consider a request

The committee voted 8 to 1 to ask the Justice Department to report to the panel by September 14 on the progress of an inquiry into Miss Fonda's actions in North Vietnam last month.

ders and to desert. Thus, he urged the attorney general to investigate "this matter, and if true to bring charges of treason" against her.

In Los Angeles, Miss Fonda invited the Justice Department to study the texts of her broadcast from North Vietnam and said she had done nothing wrong.

"I welcomed the committee members studying the texts of my broadcasts from North Vietnam," Miss Fonda said, "and after full examination they had seen
