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Strange Craft In Haiphong

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Pentagon analysts are debating whether one or two small craft seen in Haiphong harbor are additional minesweepers, possibly of Chinese origin.

Sources said the craft are smaller than the 136-foot steel hull minesweeper which the Pentagon previously acknowledged had slipped into North Vietnam's principal harbor.

The craft were described as "jury-rigged" perhaps for mine clearing work.

U.S. intelligence experts have been watching for pos-

sible signs of the appearance of the China-built minesweeper as a forerunner of a major effort to remove U.S. mines now blocking the ship channels into Haiphong against deep draft supply freighters and tonkers.

Pentagon spokesman Jerry W. Friedheim told a briefing today that there have been no minesweeping operations at Haiphong.

Friedheim said the Chinese-built minesweeper has not been attacked by U.S. bombers, which recently have made heavy strikes in the Haiphong area.

No Peace Until U.S. Out: Hanoi

SAIGON — (UPI) — North Vietnam said today there has been no substantial progress at the Paris peace talks and that peace will never come to Vietnam until the United States pulls out of the war.

Radio Hanoi broadcast monitored here said that as long as the United States continues its support of the South Vietnamese government and its bombing and blockade of North Vietnam, the war will continue.

"The Vietnamese people do not buckle under Nixon's military pressure and are all the more determined to fight on with all means at hand until the complete crushing of the U.S. war of aggression," the broadcast said.

"The Paris talks so far have not made substantial progress because Nixon stubbornly sticks to his policy of supporting the Thieu government.

"The Paris negotiations will never achieve substantial progress or concrete results so long as Nixon maintains this policy . . ."
