¶Some 20,000 fresh North Vietnamese troops have infil-trated into South Vietnam in the last six weeks, making an approximate total of 100,000 regular soldiers there. Only one training brigade is said to remain in North Vietnam.

The North Vietnamese now

have the highest number of regular troops in the Mekong River delta, southwest of Saigon, since the start of the war. The total was estimated at 20,000 to 30,000 men compared with 3,000 a year ago. Most of the infiltration has occurred since the start of the Communist offensive March 30 - and intelligence officials said that the delta now was "our biggest problem," as pacification pro-grams had become seriously threatened.

¶A third petroleum pipeline has been completed between the Chinese frontier railroad terminal of Pingsiang and Hanoi. The work began in May,
