

## CLARK GROUP FILES REPORT ON BOMBING

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, Oct. 12 (AP)—Ramsey Clark, former United States Attorney General, said today that President Nixon was making American bombers "play God" for the people of North Vietnam, but he said the North Vietnamese would not be bombed into submission.

Mr. Clark's condemnation of the American bombing was made in a written report to the third session of the International Commission of Inquiry into United States Crimes in Indochina, a private group. The Johnson Administration Cabinet member, who was not present to deliver the report in person, was a member of an international group that the commission sent to North Vietnam for two weeks in July and August to gather information on the effects of the bombing.

Mr. Clark said: "President Nixon, already responsible for ordering more bombing than any man in history, daily causes United States planes to play

God for hundreds of people in Vietnam."

Other team members reporting to the commission included the former Irish foreign minister, Sean MacBride; the French geographer, Yves Lacoste; a Danish member of Parliament, Frode Jacobsen, and Dr. N. I. Kolesnikova of the Soviet Academy of Medical Science.

In a joint report, the investigative team said that such large population centers as Haiphong and Namdinh have "largely been destroyed" while other towns, such as Ninhbinh, have been "totally razed to the ground."

The team reported "large-scale" use of perforating and fragmentation bombs and said "a surprisingly large number" of hospitals, schools and churches were found to have been bombed.

Calling the United States "a blind giant," Anthony Russo, co-defendant in the Pentagon Papers trial, said later that a wealth of newly declassified information proved the United States Government knew seven years ago the extent of war crimes being committed in Vietnam.
