Air Force Doctors Said to Take Part In Indochina Raids

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21-Two military physicians have charged that some of their medical colleagues have actively participated in dozens of bombing raids over Southeast Asia, in violation of international law, military regulations and the Hippocratic oath.

The two military physicians, both of whom still are on active duty in the Air Force, specifically said that some Air Force flight surgeons had operated weapons systems aboard F-4 phantom jets on bombing and strafing missions against enemy targets in South Vietnam and Laos. The surgeons were carried as "backseaters" aboard the two-man fighter-bombers, the doctors

The allegations were made within the last 12 days by one doctor in a personal visit and by the other in a letter to the office of Senator Harold E. Hughes, Democrat of Iowa, who is a member of the Armed Services Committee. Both officers provided their names to the
