Garavente, Anthony

"A graduate student at UCLA and the oldest member of the group at forty \dots "

* Garavente, Jean

"Taught Spanish and English-as-a-second-language in the United States, at Belmont High School in Los Angeles. Since Belmont serves the Chinatown area, many of her students were Chinese-Americans. This, plus her desire to see a revolutionary society in action, gave her a strong interest in China. She also shared a steady concern for the condition of women in China with Judy Woodard"

* Johnson, Kay Ann

"Grew up in the Midwest outside Chicago, and is now working toward a doctorate in Chinese foreign policy at the University of Wisconsin. "

* Kehl, Dorothy

"Is Chinese - she was born in Hong Kong [but fled to Kwangtung when Japanese invaded HK, Dec 41]. She had not been back to China since the end of the war in 1945. Educated in the U.S. as well as Hong Kong, [she] was teaching English to university students there for two years preceding the visit to China."

Kehl, Frank

"Has ... spent almost five years in Hong Kong. [He and Whitehead speak Cantonese and Mandarin.] [He] is in urban anthropology at Columbia, doing a thesis on the squatter settlements of Hongkong."

* Kruze, Ann

"Grew up in Mississippi, and has lived all over America. She taught elementary school for several years, and at the time we left for China she had just finished a year of teaching English in Hong Kong."

Kruze, Uldis

"Was interested in the Cultural Revolution and also in Chinese cities."

Levin, Kenneth

"Took a great interest in medicine in China - his father is a doctor in a small town in Ohio. Ken's work at the University of Wisconsin, however, is in Chinese literature."

Levine, Paul

"A twenty-four-year-old graduate student in history from Berkeley. He was also interested in the Cultural Revolution and constantly asked questions about political leadership, asking 'who runs things here' in each place we visited."

Pickowicz, Paul

"Is working on a thesis on Chinese culture, specifically on a literary critic of the 1930s. When we were in Peking, he took some of us with him to visit the home of a famous writer from that period, Lu Hsun, who had been a good friend of the literary critic Paul was writing about and had often hidden him from the police."

* Shirk, Susan

"From Long Island, New York, was one of the few members of our group who smoked — and in a country where almost everyone smokes, she had a far easier time than the rest of us. Susan's work has been concerned with education, and she is writing a dissertation on Chinese middle schools."

Whitehead, Raymond

"[Has] lived in Hong Kong for the last ten years, and [his] Cantonese is excellent... [He] is the Hong Kong representative of the World Council of Churches.

He grew up around Buffalo, New York, and graduated from Union Theological Seminary; he is now finishing a thesis on the philosophy of the Cultural Revolution. [He and his wife are in their mid-thirties, have three children.]

* Whitehead, Rhea

"[Has] lived in Hong Kong for the last ten years, and [her] Cantonese is excellent.... [She]has taught elementary school [and] paid close attention to the schools we saw."

* Woodard, Judy

"Had already spent time in Taiwan and Hong Kong. [Her] Mandarin was quite good.... Our hosts grew used to her 'women's lib' questions."

Woodward, Kim

"A political science student at Stanford, is doing his dissertation on the last two decades of China's foreign policy."
