HOOVER CHALLENGED ON DR. KING INQUIRY

By The Associated Press MILWAUKEE, April 28 — J. Edgar Hoover's role in the in-vestigation of the assassination of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther' King Jr. was challenged by an

King Jr. was challenged by an executive of the American Civil Liberties Union in a speech here Sunday night. He said the investigation should be headed by "more credible" men. Charles Morgan Jr., saying that Mr. Hoover once describel Dr. King as "the most notori-ous liar in the country," called on him, as director of the Fed-eral Bureau of Investigation to remove himself from the in-quiry. He said that President Johnson should name to lead it Johnson should name to lead it "a man or a group of men whose integrity and commit-

whose integrity and commit-ment to the cause of integra-tion and equal justice is above question." Mr. Morgan criticized what he termed the F.B.I.'s instruc-tions to police that the alleged assassin was "armed and ex-tremely dangerous." He said this might make it more likely that the man arrested would be killed.
