The police in Atlanta, where the shooting occurred yesterday, have said that they thought Mr. Chenault, 23 years old, had acted alone.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Dayton police have refused to comment, but hotel employes reported that they heard voices in Room 813, which was occupied by Mr. Chenault.

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The F.B.I. obtained a search warrant for the room this afternoon. The authorities also confiscated an automobile driven by Mr. Chenault when he checked into the hotel, as well as clothing and a tape recorder in the room.

Hotel employes said that Mr. Mr. Chenault's activity before the shooting has left many questions unanswered and made even more mysterious by his connection with

questions unanswered and made even more mysterious by his statements in connection with the incident. He has said he was on a "mission for God."

Puzzling to the authorities is the fact that Mr. Chenault could have stayed with his parents here instead of going to a hotel.

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Also, his father reported Saturday that two guns were stolen Friday night or Saturday morning during a break-in at the Chenault home, situated in a middle-class, predominantly black neighborhood on the city's west side.

The police also wondered why Mr. Chenault came to Dayton. He has lived in Columbus, 70 miles to the east, where he dropped out last December as a student at Ohio State University.
