'No' Vote

WASHINGTON — (UPI) — Sen. John Tunney (D-Calif.) says too many questions remain unanswered and he will vote against the nomination of Richard Kleindienst as Attorney General if Senate hearings on International Telephone and Telegraph are "choked off."

"It would be most unfortunate if we cut off the hearings," Tunney said yesterday. "I think the American people would be gravely disappointed."

Unsatisfied

Senate Republican Leader Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania and Sen. Roman Hruska (R-Neb.), ranking member of the Senate Judiciary Committee, both have called for an end to hearings of an anti-trust settlement with ITT.

Tunney said he won't be satisfied until he hears testimony from several prospective witnesses — including White House aide Peter Flanigan.

Someone Lied

Tunney was asked whether conflicting testimony heard by the committee indicated that perjury had been committed by someone.

He replied that in comparing the statements of ITT lobbyist Dita Beard and of Brit Hume, an associate of columnist Jack Anderson, it was clear that "someone had perjured himself."
