Chile Takes Fight With I.T.T. to U.N. Unit

SANTIAGO, Chile, April 13-President Salvador Allende Gossens put before a United Nations economic conference of 161 nations today his quarrel with the International Tele-phone and Telegraph Company and United States copper corporations.

Addressing the opening session of the third United Nations Conference on Trade and Development, Dr. called for condemnation of American multinational corporations that he said had sought to "upset the normal functioning" of the Government and "its economic relations with the rest of the world."

He accused, the American copper companies whose properties here have been nationalized, in most cases without compensation, of exercising pressure on the United States Government to "prevent Chile from obtaining new terms and
