

Intervention Charge By Chile

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Chile accused the International Telephone and Telegraph Corp. today of open intervention in Chile's internal affairs.

It also rebuked what Chile said was the failure of U.S. government officials to halt ITT's alleged efforts to block the election of President Salvador Allende in 1970.

Fourth Session

Addressing the fourth session of the General Assembly of the Organization of American States, Chilean Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs Anibal Palma declared:

"Chile denounces these deeds and raises its protest before the international community and on doing so it reaffirms the determination of its people and government to proceed with their revolutionary duties."

Policies Hit

In a sweeping condemnation of Nixon administration policies toward Chile, Palma also accused the United States of a "direct and serious" violation of the principle of non-intervention in what he said were American efforts to renegotiate a foreign debt which exceeds \$3 billion.

The ITT accusations were based on a series of documents released last month by columnist Jack Anderson and attributed to ITT officials that alleged ITT was prepared to assist in sums up to seven figures to help block Allende's election and thereby protect its multimillion dollar Chilean holdings.
