To head a newly created Government watchdog committee to prevent bureaucrats from overzealously using secrecy stamps, President Nixon named John S. D. Eisenhower.

Mr. Eisenhower, son of the late Dwight D. Eisenhower and the father of Mr. Nixon's son-in-law, David Eisenhower, will be chairman of a com-mittee that will include senior officials of the Justice, De-fense and State Departments, the Atomic Energy Commis-sion and the Central Intelli-gence Agency. The committee will hear appeals from the public for speedier declassifi-cation of specific documents, as well as implement an Executive Order of March 8 that Mr. Nixon said would make more Government docu-ments available to the public. The Executive Order estab-lished an automatic declassi-fication schedule for docu-ments stamped after July 1, calling for declassification within 6, 8 or 10 years for almost all documents.
