A WITNESS SAYS G.I.'S SLEW 300 IN VILLAGE

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PARIS, Dec. 19—A sobbing Vietnamese girl asserted at a newsconference here today that American troops ha dslaughtered 300 men, women and children in her village, Binhchau, in the commune of Balangan, in Quangngai province.

This, she said, was on Jan. 13 of this year—nearly 10 months after the alleged massacre at Songmy, which is also in Quangngai.

The girl, 21-year-old Pham Thi Lign, was one of a series of witnesses introduced by the International Center of Information For the Denunciation of War Crimes. They were presented by Jean-Paul Sartre, the chairman, in an effort to prove that Songmy "was not an isolated incident." Mr. Sartre was a member of the so-called Bertrand Russell War Crimes Tribunal, which met last in Roskildg, Dgnmark, in 1967.

Two American and two Canadian physicians who had studied or worked in South Vietnam discussed the ravages of chemical warfare, and an American deserter now living in Canada told of alleged atrocities he had heard about or seen.
