Calley's Attorney On Way to Mylai With Prosecutor

FORT BENNING, Ga., Jan. 2 (AP)—The Army defense attorney for Lieut. William L. Calley Jr. and the prosecution officer left today by plane for personal investigations at Mylai, scene of an alleged massacre.

The 26-year-old lieutenant faces trial by court-martial on charges of murdering 110 Vietnamese civilians, 109 at the village of Mylai in March, 1968. No date has been set for the trial.

Maj. Kenneth Raby, Lieutenant Calley's Army counsel, and a prosecution attorney, Capt. Aubrey Daniel, were granted temporary duty orders for the trip, to be paid for by the Army.

The defense filed two motions today. One requests the Government to show cause why the commanding general of Fort Benning should not be ordered to make available to the defense sufficient funds to enable them to hire special investigators.

The other motion asks the Government to make available all memorandums, messages and writings about Mylai that may be in possession of Government officials.

Motion Hints at Politics

FORT BENNING, Ga., Jan. 2 (UPI)—The motion asking that the Government be ordered to disclose all messages and correspondence concerning Mylai said:

"Writings may exist that establish that the alleged Mylai incident is considered such grave political import as to require prompt conviction and punishment of the accused."

Meadlo to Appear

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (UPI)] —Paul Meadlo, who admitted I in a television interview to killing 10 to 15 villagers at Mylai, is scheduled to appear Monday before the Pentagon panel investigating the alleged massacre, the Defense Department said today.
