New Move By Calley Defense

Counsel for Lieutenant Villiam L. Calley Jr. requested yesterday that the Army be required to furnish full details on each of he 110 slayings of which he is accused.

They also asked that all uplicating specifications against Calley be dropped.

The motions were filed by Calley's civilian attorney, Feorge Latimer of Salt Lake City, in a letter to Lieutenant Colonel Reid W. Kennedy, he trial judge.

Calley, 26, a native of Miumi, Fla., faces a general court-martial on charges of laying 109 civilians at the lietnamese village of My Lai m March 16, 1968. He also is accused of slaying "one adult nale" civilian about six reeks before the My Lai acion.

In one of his latest moions, Latimer asked that the
rosecution be required speifically to give names,
imes, places, dates and locaions involved in each of the
accusations. He also asked
hat the government spell out
whether it will try to prove a
single intent to kill all of the
alleged victims or a specific
ntent with respect to each
pecification.

As an alternate to the secand motion, which asked that
'duplicitous or multipliious" specifications be
be lropped, Latimer suggested
hat the government be orlered to designate the particlar case upon which it will
ely during the trial.

Calley's defense attorneys, attimer and Army Major Kenneth A. Raby, have filed several previous motions including one that all charges against Calley be dropped on grounds that he is being held n the Army illegally. A hearing on those motions has been set January 20.
