

**SECRECY IS IMPOSED
ON MYLAI HEARINGS**

WASHINGTON, April 11 (AP)

—A Congressional investigation of the alleged massacre of South Vietnamese civilians at Mylai will begin Wednesday under strict secrecy.

Representative F. Edward Hébert, Democrat of Louisiana, who is chairman of a House Armed Services subcommittee established to conduct the inquiry, said Saturday that all sessions would be closed and not even photographs of witnesses would be permitted without their permission.

The subcommittee will also prohibit witnesses from discussing their testimony outside the hearing room, Mr. Hébert said, and he will be the only subcommittee member authorized to speak to news media.

“And it is my present intention,” he said, “not to say anything in the near future unless a clarifying statement becomes necessary.”
