

Are we all on trial at Fort Benning today?

At Nuremberg a quarter-century ago, the United States denounced not only the war crimes of the Nazis but also aggression by any other nations, "including those which sit here now in judgment."

Today, fingers of accusation are pointed at America herself, and many of the pointing fingers are our own. Is there truth in the charge that principles established at Nuremberg have been violated by the United States in Vietnam—and especially at Son My?
