## **3 MORE LEAVING KISSINGED'S STAFF**

## 2 Other Members Reported Planning to Resign

WASHINGTON, May 22 — The National Security Council staff headed by Henry A. Kis-singer is losing at least three more members and there are unverifeid reports that two others are also quitting. These departures follow res-ignations by six Council staff members lst year. Leaving are Laurence E. Lynn, director of the Council's program analysis staff; Ro-ger P. Morris, who has been handling special projects for Mr. Kissinger, and W. Anthony Lake, of Mr. Kissinger's personal staff. It is understood that Mr. Lak

personal staff. It is understood that Mr. Lak is leaving for a number of rea-sons, one of which is his objec-tion to the Administration's military operations in Cambo-dia. Mr. Lynn said he was leav-ing for personal reasons.

Sources report that other Council staff members share Mr. Lake's concern about policy in Cambodia and are also un-happy about their personal working conditions. The members of the staff who are said to be leaving could not be reached for com-ment, and others would not speak for publication. Asked about theresignations, Mr. Kis-singer said he preferred that his assistants speak for them-selves.

singer said ... his assistants speak for them-selves. The Council staff does re-search and policy planning in foreign affairs. Its job is essen-tially to provide the Council, headed by the President, with information, options and ad-vice on national security issues. Departures Expected by Fall It could not be determined why the 32-year-old Mr. Mor-ris was leaving. He has not yet set a date for his departure, but it was reported that he plan-ned to leave before the fall. It is understood that Mr. Lynn, who is also 32, will leave in late summer to take a teach-ing position at the graduate

in late summer to take a teach-ing position at the graduate school of business at Stanford University.

University. Mr. Lynn is said to be leav-ing the staff because of the pressures and long hours. Those familiar with the Coun-cil staff report that two more of Mr. Kissinger's assistants either have resigned or plan to do so. They say that a number of factors have led to unhappi-ness among other Council memness among other Council members

One of the major causes of disenchantment appears to be the Administration's decision to mount military operations decision to mount military operations in Cambodia. Another seems to be the heavy demands that Mr. issinger makes on his staff in terms of workload and hours —demands that are said to be

-demands that are said to be communicated sometimes in peremptory fashion. Those who left the Council staff last year are Dr. Morton Halperin, Richard M. Moose, Richard V. Allen, Lawrence S. Eagleburger, Daniel I. David-son and Richard L. Sneider.
