POLICE CAUTIONED ON FIREARMS USE

Justice Unit Says Protests Should Be Kept Cool

The advice was contained in a 43-page report circulated by the Justice Department. But a stronger warning had been destronger warning had been destronger the propert. the report.

The draft form of the report included an admonition that even in responding to sniper fire, great care should be taken to make certain that the sniper

was the only target of gunfire.

The report was prepared for use as a guide to public officials in the nation's cities.

It was scheduled as the basis for testimony of Richard C. Kleindienst, Deputy Attorney General, tomorrow before the Senate Subcommittee on Administrative Practice.

Fears for the Innocent

The draft of the report re-leased by the Justice Depart-ment but later deleted said:

"Appropriate police action will never permit a demonstration to deteriorate to the point that the use of firearms is nec-essary to control the crowd.

"Even when the lives of law enforcement officers or citizens are endangered by sniper fire, great care must be used to as-

sure that the individual causing to the shooting is the only object s of police action involving the use of firearms.

"It must be recognized that the use of firearms is inconsistent with the Government objective of protecting the lives of its innocent citizens."
