Mr. Thant and Edvard Hambro, President of the General Assembly, were told informally of the White House dinner plans last Thursday by Charles W. Yost, the United States permanent representative. Both officials are understood to have pointed out the conflict between the proposed White House function and the United Nations program. Nations program.
