Pentagon Reports Arrival Of Soviet Planes in Havana

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (Reu-ters)—Two Soviet TU-95 long-range reconnaissance planes flew into Havana Thursday after nonstop flights from Mos-cow, the Defense Department reported today

It was not known whether their arrival was connected with Moscow's increased opera-tions in Cuban waters, a Penta-gon spokesman, Jerry W. Fried-heim, said. He added that similar recon-naissance flights to Cuba were reported earlier this year. Mr. Friedheim also said that a Soviet submarine had been spotted by United States in-telligence planes moving north of Haiti and toward Havana. The submarine is among ves-sels that Moscow has an-nounced will call at Cuban ponts.

**U.S.** Reports Close Watch On Soviet Craft Near Cuba

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21 (Reu-ters)—The White House is watching Soviet submarine ac-tivity around Cuba "very close-ly" but does not yet see any threat from Soviet naval activ-ity a seakasman said today

threat from Soviet naval activ-ity, a spokesman said today. The White House press secre-tary, Ronald L. Zeigler, said President Nixon expected that the Russians would abide by a 1962 agreement in which Mos-cow pledged not to deploy of-fensive missiles in Cuba. Mr. Ziegler, answering ques-tions, said that a judgment had not yet been made on whether the Soviet Union-was building a submarine base at Cienfuegos in Cuba to serve its nuclear sub-marines.

"We are following the devel-opments in and around Cuba very closely," he added.
